The palate is beautifully balanced and sensual, the plush dark cherry and wild strawberry fruit framed by fine tannins, lavish yet sophisticated in bottle. The 1985 is even better from magnum, ebullient and multidimensional on the nose with traces of ripe oranges. Will the 1982 last 100 years? The 1900 Margaux is an immortal wine largely because it is still so young and fresh, with all the nuances and complexities that wine enthusiasts hope will develop. Splendidly rich, with a perfume that must fill a room, unbelievably unctuous, opulent, and well-focused, this is a winemaking tour de force. The fact that it manages to balance power and high extraction of flavor with both finesse and elegance makes it stand out as one of the most extraordinary wines I have ever tasted. 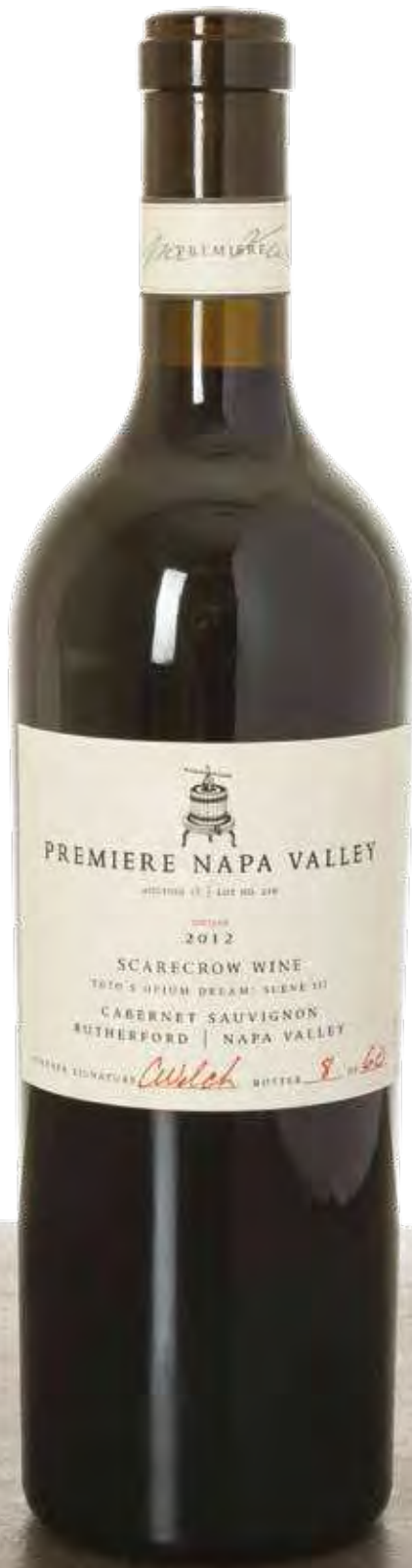

Carved in Granite: The Maine Cellar

From a distinguished private cellar in coastal Maine comes one of the most thoughtfully assembled and carefully maintained collections to appear at auction in recent years. Built in the 1970s as a dedicated underground extension to the home, the cellar was meticulously engineered in the spirit of the great passive cellars of Europe, drawing inspiration from Professor Richard M. Gold's seminal work, *How and Why to Build a Wine Cellar*. Carved directly into granite bedrock and lined with thick concrete, it was designed from the outset to provide a naturally stable environment for long-term aging.

Arranged across multiple descending levels that follow the natural grade of the land, the cellar sits deep beneath the surface, where it benefits from a consistent, gently shifting temperature cycle, ranging approximately from 52°F to 60°F over the course of the year, along with naturally high humidity. This equilibrium, achieved without artificial climate control, reflects a deliberate and highly informed approach to wine storage, prioritizing gradual evolution and preservation.

Upon visiting the cellar in person, one is struck immediately by its sense of quiet purpose and authenticity. The bottles, numbering in the thousands, are meticulously organized by region and vintage, reflecting a collector of uncommon discipline and devotion. Nearly every bottle is fitted with a handwritten neck tag, allowing for easy identification without unnecessary handling, an exacting practice that has helped preserve both labels and provenance in remarkable condition.

The collection took shape with original cases of the great 1982 Bordeaux and evolved with equal intention to include the most sought-after names across the world's great wine regions. Today, it reads as a true "who's who" of the wine world: First Growth Bordeaux in depth, iconic Burgundy from revered domaines such as Leroy, the great estates of the Rhône, and the leading lights of Italy and Champagne, each selected with knowledge, access, and purpose.

Equally compelling is the evidence in the glass. During a recent visit, I had the pleasure of sharing a beautifully prepared home-cooked meal with the collectors, during which several bottles were opened across regions. Each showed superbly, vivid, harmonious, and remarkably youthful, with pristine corks and impeccable condition. Some wines displayed a freshness and vitality that belied their age by decades, a testament to the cellar's natural equilibrium and the integrity of its stewardship.

A rare offering that unites vision, provenance, and performance, this collection stands as a profound expression of a life devoted to great wine.
